MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

The 69th Annual Meeting in Las Vegas was Awesome!

The SCEH annual meeting took place from October 10-14 and produced many memorable moments, against the backdrop of the Las Vegas strip!

The keynote presenters, invited speakers, and symposia presented a combination of data-based scientific presentations and inspirational perspectives on the future of hypnosis in integrative healthcare. This issue of FOCUS includes several items about the meeting, including photos.

Recognition. My special thanks go out to executive director Anne Doherty Johnson and the SCEH program committee, including Program Chair Janna Henning, Science Chairs Shelagh Freedman and Zoltan Kekecs, Advanced Workshop Chairs Ciara Christensen and David Reid, and Introductory Workshop Chairs Eric Willmarth and Paul Larson.

The social events that brought members together were the Networking Reception Thursday evening, the Student and Early Career Professionals Luncheon on Friday, the Women's Breakfast on Saturday, the Member Luncheon on Saturday, and the Awards Banquet Saturday evening. The Embassy Suites' staff also worked over-time to provide warm hospitality and service.

Executive Council Meeting

The Executive Council (EC) is the governing body of SCEH and is composed of all past-presidents in attendance at the annual meeting, current officers, and chairs of standing committees. This year the Executive Council met on Friday evening, and reviewed the state of the society, including budget, meetings held, and committee activities.

The EC approved a new "Policy on Diversity and Inclusivity." This policy supports current efforts to reach out and extend a specific welcome to early career professionals, women, ethnic and sexual minorities, and any other group under-represented in SCEH. The

objective is twofold: to support growth in the SCEH membership, and to educate professionals in hypnosis that better reflect the demographics of the general population. Inclusiveness and diversity are major themes among professional societies today, in healthcare and elsewhere. The new policy is now posted on the SCEH website.

The EC also discussed the changes of the membership requirements in the SCEH bylaws, which opened the doors for additional professional groups to join SCEH. Several members of the EC suggested that if SCEH is to have a meaningful place in the future of healthcare, the requirements should be modified further, and additional professional groups welcomed into full membership.

The SCEH 70th Annual Meeting for October 2019
The 70th annual meeting will take place in New Orleans from October 16-20, 2019. Mark your calendars now, as you will not want to miss this 70th Anniversary celebration.

The event will be held at the Ace Hotel on Carondelet Street. The co-chairs for the New Orleans meeting will be Ciara Christensen and David Reid. The meeting theme will be: Clinical and Applied Hypnosis: Evidenced-Based Practice and the Therapeutic Relationship

Mid-Year Meeting in Denver, April 26-27, 2018 SCEH plans a Mid-Year Training event in Denver, Colorado, Friday/Saturday, April 26-27, 2019. The program will include an "Introduction to Clinical Hypnosis," with Donald Moss and Eric Willmarth, an "Intermediate Clinical Hypnosis" training with Ian Wickramasekera, and an advanced workshop by Gary Elkins on "Evidence-Based Hypnosis: Anxiety, Pain, and Sleep."

The basic, intermediate hypnosis, and advanced training will provide 12.5 hours of clinical hypnosis training each and can be applied to the SCEH Certification requirements.

The Colorado Society for Clinical Hypnosis will assist SCEH in marketing. Please tell your students or colleagues about this hypnosis training opportunity.

Volunteers Needed

The backbone of any professional society is the work of volunteers. SCEH currently is seeking volunteers for the following positions.

Education Chair: SCEH needs a new Education Chair to oversee all educational programs, including those at the Annual Conference, Midyear Workshops and online educational activities. The Education Chair will coordinate with the Conference Committee Co-Chairs, the Executive Director and the President in planning educational activity, assuring quality, and obtaining CE credit.

Legacy Development Chair. SCEH is seeking a long-term member to contact other SCEH members and discuss creating bequests and legacy gifts for SCEH as an organization, as well as for the SCEH scholarship fund. We can define a Legacy gift as follows: "The creation of a future gift to a non-profit organization such as SCEH." Any individual can set up a legacy gift simply by naming a non-profit organization on the beneficiary form of a savings, checking, or pension account; remembering a charity in a will or living trust; or using a more complex

instrument such as a charitable life-income trust. All of these forms of legacy giving demonstrate a meaningful way for individuals to create a philanthropic legacy for a cause they care about.

Marketing Chair: SCEH needs an individual to organize SCEH campaigns to promote its events and programs. The Marketing Chair will work with the Annual Conference Co-Chairs, the Executive Director and the President in promoting SCEH activities. The Marketing Chair may also coordinate with the Membership Chair to plan marketing campaigns to solicit new members.

Webinar Chair: SCEH needs an individual to organize a SCEH webinar series for professional continuing education, to recruit speakers for specific topics, and to coordinate the actual delivery of webinars. The Webinar Chair may also provide IT technical support for the webinars or may recruit a volunteer to serve as technical support. The Webinar Chair reports to the SCEH Education Chair and to the President.

I am a 4th year PhD student at Baylor University in Waco, Texas, USA. In our doctoral program we take a number of courses and have regular teaching opportunities in the Psychology and Neuroscience Department. We also learn within a lab that aligns with our research interests, so I am a researcher in the Mind-Body Medicine Research Lab (MBMRL) which is directed by Dr. Gary Elkins.

I collaborate with fellow PhD, PsyD, and undergraduate students to help design, carry out, and disseminate research. I am currently working on various stress or hypnosis-related studies, including my dissertation. Much of my research assesses clinical applications and efficacy of hypnosis. I also study psychophysiological changes associated with hypnosis and mind-body medicines, as I am interested in the mechanisms of response to these treatments.

My other hypnosis-related role is as managing editor of the *International Journal of Clinical and Experimental Hypnosis*. I communicate with authors, reviewers, copy editors, and the publishing company to help ensure high-quality articles are published in each quarterly issue. Led by the editor, Dr. Elkins, the journal aims to support new researchers and clinicians. We invite students, and anyone who is new to research or writing, to submit your work for peer review consideration or to email us (ijceh@baylor.edu) with your journal-related questions.

I have been attending SCEH annual meetings only since 2016 but have already seen benefits of being in this community. The conferences offer a chance to meet and listen to influential leaders in the field, and it is a supportive environment for presenting your work. The first time I attended a SCEH conference there were very few students, and I felt welcomed but a bit out of place. In just 3 years, the growing involvement of young members and new professionals has been noticeable and encouraging. A more varied member base (whether age, ethnicity, background, the list goes on...) brings new ideas to the table and strengthens societies. I encourage students to find mentors among those who are more experienced and to attend workshops and scientific meetings.

Over the past few years, I have enjoyed connecting with fellow SCEH members, and I look forward to seeing you all in the near future.

Interview with Dr. Katalin Varga, Co-Chair of the Hypnosis: New Generation 2019 Conference


Dear Kata, as the mastermind and one of the main organizers behind the Hypnosis: New Generation (H:NG) conference, to take place between the 30th of May and 1st of June 2019, in Budapest, Hungary, could you please tell me what is the concept of this conference and how it occurred to you?

Yes, well there were two main considerations in working out the concept of H:NG. We were having an interesting conversation with a few colleagues at the European Society of Hypnosis' conference back in 2017 in Manchester, UK, and some financial aspects came up in that conversation. That is when I found out that a surprisingly big percentage of the society's income actually goes into paying big hotels' and/or congress centers' fees for these events. That is what got me thinking that maybe it would be beneficial to start a new line of conferences. The idea is basically that the scientific content would be just as high-standard as for example at the triennial meetings, while the service part would be more modest. So the first consideration is this: on one hand we want to keep these prestigious, elegant conference locations, especially for the triennial conferences of the ISH and the ESH, which are in a way more formal and express the importance and solemnity of the event. On the other hand, we would like to start a new line of meetings with maybe somewhat different atmosphere and background. And we here in Budapest happen to be so consideration is linked to this first one, which is that it is important to

involve the younger colleagues, to encourage them to take part in congresses, present their findings, to allow the older and the younger professionals to have a platform where they can exchange ideas, get to know each other and so on. So I combined these two goals and that is how the conference got its name: "Hypnosis: New Generation. New trends in research and clinical application."

That sounds great, and how do you plan to actually involve the younger generation? What makes this conference attractive to them?

Firstly, entry fees will depend on the professional age of an individual, meaning that the more recent someone's degree is, the less they pay, making H:NG 2019 very affordable. And second, we plan to have younger colleagues give the keynote speeches too, and they



will have all kinds of different platforms to present their findings. The aim is really to see and hear the new faces of the field. We are also planning workshops on for example tips and tricks of how to publish papers, enhancing one's presence in the scientific world, so issues that are important and interesting for beginners.

Okay, so what happens then with the more accomplished, older generation? Where is their place in all this?

Oh they most definitely have a place, an important one too. As mentors of the newer generation, they are more than encouraged to come to H:NG 2019 to share their knowledge and experiences with the younger colleagues. We are planning to bring in new forms of programs by which we hope to give opportunity for more informal networking, so that the new generation can actually meet and talk to the more experienced professionals. Such new programs will be for example the 'Scientific Speed Dating', or 'Conversation Hour', which are specifically designed for the conference participants to have the possibility and time to talk to accomplished professionals, with whom they otherwise might not be able to have a conversation in person.

And you said you have the perfect location for these purposes.

Indeed we do. Budapest by the way traditionally organizes memorable conferences like the Eurohypnosis 1996 conference, participants of that congress till today tell me how great it was. Or for example the 1st International Congress of Medical Hypnosis, also held in Budapest, 2013. This is probably not surprising,

the city itself is breathtaking with a steady spot on the lists of most beautiful places to visit both Europe- and worldwide. For H:NG 2019, we will have the recently renovated building of the Faculty of Pedagogy and

Psychology of Eötvös Loránd University. I could not be happier about this, because the building is nice and relatively modernized, and it is located right in the heart of downtown Budapest, in the old city. So that means that a great many of the city's attractions are within walking distance, not to mention good restaurants, cafés and bars in all price ranges. It is the perfect place to have a conference such as this with plenty of rooms and the location also allows participants to explore the city a bit.

So let's say during a break after a lecture and scientific speed-dating you could go out and do some sightseeing?

That is right, for example the historic Grand Synagogue, the largest functioning synagogue in Europe is some 3 minutes away. The so-called Budapest Eye is similarly close, if one would like to get a glimpse of the city from above. Not to mention all kinds of culinary experiences one can try in this area. It is quite literally the liveliest part of the city. One might even be interested in the famous ruin pubs we have here in Budapest, the best-known one is on the same street as where the conference takes place. You could do all that and make it back to the conference just in time for the Science Slam.



Science Slam? What happens there?

That is also one of the new programs we are planning, one of the most fun probably. You present your scientific research or therapeutic insights in a rhyming, musical.

poem-like or stand up comedy-like way, like in slam poetry. Basically you explain your findings in any artistic form of your preference. It has been a long pursuit to bring research and clinical aspects of hypnosis closer together, and one basic principal for that is to present research findings in a clear, not overcomplicated way, along with their clinical implications. Science Slam gives all that an entertaining, informal atmosphere. We tried it at our department before and it worked so well that I thought it would be a shame to exclude it from H:NG.

That does sound like lots of fun. It also seems like there really will be quite a few new types of programs.

Yes, that is the whole point. Any professional working with or interested in hypnosis and suggestive communication is eligible for application, and we are broadening the variety of programs so that there is something interesting for everyone. Those who prefer more traditional programs need not to worry either: there will be lectures, workshops, poster sessions as well. Also if someone is for example interested in giving a lecture or a workshop but cannot make it to Budapest at that time, we also happily accept applications for lectures via Skype. So all together another aim is inclusivity, and hopefully to promote hypnosis to the widest possible professional audiences. It is always great to see and to experience just how colorful the variety of applying and researching hypnosis can be, how many different areas of life can benefit from the possibilities that lie within.

So you are saying that any profession is welcome to H:NG 2019 and that the conference's main goal is to provide a place for the younger and older generations to meet, to discuss, to engage.

Exactly. Anyone using or interested in using hypnosis is welcome, whether it be in sports, psychotherapy, medical applications, coaching and so on. And our motto for the conference is that it is an engagement and nurturing of our future, our professional future.

You are one of the Co-Chairs of Organization of H:NG 2019. Who else is behind the conference?

The co-organizers are Semmelweis Medical University, Anesthesiology and Intensive Care Clinic, the Department of Affective Psychology at Eötvös Loránd University, and the Hungarian Association of Hypnosis. However the International Society of Hypnosis and the European Society of Hypnosis are nominal co-sponsors, as well as the International Journal of Clinical and Experimental Hypnosis.

Thank you very much for the interview. Just one last question: where can we find more information and updates on H:NG 2019?

Call for Papers

Evidence-Based Clinical Case Studies

The *International Journal of Clinical and Experimental Hypnosis* is issuing an invitation for authors to submit relevant and innovative Evidence-Based Clinical Case Studies for consideration for possible publication. As the Editor-in-Chief I am initiating this call for papers as clinical case study research can identify new theoretical ideas and show the potential of combining hypnosis with other therapies. Such studies can also reveal innovative applications of hypnosis and potential feasibility. Rich clinical data helps to bridge the gap between empirical research and clinical practice, as thoroughly described interventions provide clinical methods for further research and replication.

Submissions should review relevant literature, offer verbatim hypnosis transcripts, and provide empirical outcome data, discussion, and recommendations. Authors must provide scientific justification for the intervention, clearly identify the rationale, describe the intervention, and provide objective outcome data. The following guidelines should be followed by those that are interested in submitting an Evidence-Based Clinical Case Study for peer review and consideration for publication in the *International Journal of Clinical and Experimental Hypnosis*.

Evidence Based Clinical Case Studies should include the following components:

- · Cover page and Abstract of 140 words or less.
- · Comprehensive and relevant review of previous research.
- Appropriate informed consent must be obtained before any measures are administered.
- Description of case(s) with well-substantiated clinical diagnosis or symptom presence.
- · Patient's history, referral source, and relevant details.
- At least two standardized assessment measures (completed by the patient or an independent rater) of the target symptom, problem, and/or global rating.
- Measures should be administered at least twice—at baseline and end of treatment, and may also be reported at long-term follow-up.
- · Details of the hypnotic induction used, procedures used, specific suggestions.
- · Data analysis of results/outcomes.
- · Discussion of findings (successful or unsuccessful).
- · Discussion of study limitations, implications for clinical practice, and future research recommendations.

Additional components recommended for clinical case studies:

- · Assessment of hypnotizability is strongly encouraged as well as measures of treatment expectancy.
- Use of both self-report and objective (e.g., physiological) data, if available.
- Clinical transcripts and vignettes should be included to illustrate the intervention and provide enough detail to allow for clinical use or for potential replication by other investigators. Hypnosis intervention transcripts may be included as an appendix.

SCEH Annual Conference: Report on the Scientific Program

This year's Scientific Program was once again a huge success! Following the format from last year, keynote addresses were given throughout SCEH's annual conference. SCEH President Donald Moss opened the conference Wednesday evening with his address, *The Place of Hypnosis in Integrative Healthcare*. This fittingly gave an overview of the conference theme - *Hypnosis in Integrated/Integrative Healthcare: Collaborative, Connected and Creative Approaches*. After the Presidential Address, Roxanna Erickson-Klein, the seventh child of hypnosis pioneer Milton Erickson, discussed *The Past, Present and Future of Hypnosis*, sharing memories of growing up with Milton Erickson, his strong work ethic and approach to hypnosis, and her personal perspectives on the future of hypnosis.

David Patterson, professor of psychology at the University of Washington School of Medicine, captivated his large audience with a keynote addressing Hypnosis, Zen and Suffering. Bringing us up to date on his research and thoughts on the integration of Buddhist perspectives into hypnosis practice and pain treatment, he promoted viewing the mind/brain as a process rather than a dualistic entity. Elvira Lang, past-president of SCEH and founder of ComfortTalk®, a corporation providing training in hypnotic language and techniques for hospital personnel, discussed *Hypnosis in the Age of Value-Based Medicine*, and its significance for the future of hypnosis. She advocated training hundreds of thousands of health care professionals and line staff, to incorporate hypnotic language into every medical encounter.

Michael Yapko was awarded SCEH's 2018 Arthur Shapiro Award for the Best Book in Hypnosis for the fourth time in his career. In addition to his many books on hypnosis, he is known for his international training program. During his keynote, Mood and Medicine: Depression's Stranglehold on Healthcare, he discussed the burden of depression and how hypnosis practitioners can provide truly integrated care. Gary Elkins, another SCEH past-president, addressed the use of Hypnotic Relaxation Therapy as an evidence-based intervention for

integrative healthcare in his keynote. Citing extensive research, hypnotic relaxation therapy has been documented to provide benefits for persons with hot flashes, sleep disturbances, pain, sexual health, and anxiety.

The Scientific Program this year also included two invited addresses. Vince Polito, a research fellow at Macquarie University in Australia, delivered an address on the Cognitive and Physiological Markers of Altered Agency in

Hypnosis. Recounting the evolution of his research, he shared how studying altered states in sweat lodges originally inspired his studies on the hypnotic sense of agency. Russell Hurlburt, a pioneer in the introspective exploration of human consciousness, and a Las Vegas local, provided the closing address for the annual meeting: Exploring Inner Experience in the Natural Environment. He discussed his methodology, the common characteristics of everyday inner experience, and guided the audience to sample and describe their own inner experience.

In addition to paper presentations, four symposia were held over the weekend. Lindsey McKernan and David Patterson organized a relevant and informative symposium, From Training to Practicing Hypnosis in Integrative Medicine: An Empirical Case Study, with presenters Alexandra Chadderdon, Landrew Sevel, and Shelby Reyes. Shelagh Freedman led a symposium on Hypnosis and Memory with Arreed Barabasz, Janna Henning, Richard Kluft, and Michael Yapko, which presented various views on the subject. Zoltan Kekecs arranged and guided a discussion on Assessing Hypnotizability in a Clinical Setting with John Alexander, Gary Elkins, and Elvira Lang, providing many insights. Finally, inspired by the Las Vegas location, Shelagh Freedman invited stage hypnotists, Michael DeSchalit, Catherine Hickland, and Richard Nongard to share their experience and views on hypnosis during the symposium: What Can We Learn from Stage Hypnosis? - A wonderfully educational and entertaining discussion!

The 2018 Poster Session was particularly inspiring, with even greater participation than the past years. Saturday afternoon, presenters gave a quick overview of their poster topic during the Poster Blitz Session. The poster session, held during the cocktail reception immediately before the Award's banquet, had a large gathering of conference attendees interacting with the 16 poster presenters. There was much to examine and learn.

We look forward to working on next year's Scientific Program in New Orleans, October 16-20th 2019. Keep your eyes out for information on submission deadlines and start thinking about what you would like to see included in the program.

PERSPECTIVES ON DIVERSITY By Madeline Stein

SCEH hosted their first annual Female-Identified Women's Breakfast at the **2018 Annual Conference**. This breakfast was hosted by SCEH President Elect, Dr. Janna Henning, and was attended by female-identified SCEH members. Dr. Henning facilitated a conversation amongst female-identified students, early career professionals, and established professional members on what changes they would like to see as SCEH works to be more inclusive of diverse populations.

As an attendee, it was exciting to meet with other female-identified participants and hear about their experiences. **Speaking for myself**, **it felt empowering to be asked for feedback**. While it is exciting to see SCEH move towards inclusivity, it was also frustrating to reflect on my own, and on others' experiences in a historically male-dominated organization.

At points in our conversation, I felt despondent about the lack of safety and esteem female-identified members have been met with, not only at SCEH, but within other professional organizations as well. My intention in sharing this is not to place blame, but rather to invoke readers to reflect on their own experience's and how well-intentioned gestures, and comments, may have a different impact than intended. Ultimately, it is commendable that these, sometimes, difficult conversations about diversity are being held as SCEH moves towards being more inclusive. I feel hopeful for the future of the organization and the hypnosis community.

Amongst other attendees, the overarching consensus is that breakfast participants would like to see more female-identified presenters at SCEH trainings and student members would like an opportunity to receive hypnosis mentoring from female-identified people. As a result of this breakfast, student member, Shelby Robinson, has created a SCEH Facebook group for female-identified and gender non-conforming individuals. The intention of this group is to help facilitate and encourage dialogue amongst female-identified and gender non-conforming SCEH members. Lastly, **as a reminder to all SCEH members** please remember that we all come from different life experiences, some may have aversions to being touched. Please remember to be thoughtful and ask for consent before touching others while at SCEH workshops and trainings.
